Ibuprofen/Paracetamol - risks of kounis syndrome &fixed drug eruption

EDA performs label update to include the following:

4.4 SPECIAL WARNINGS AND PRECAUTIONS FOR USE

Hypersensitivity reactions to Mersynofen can also progress to Kounis syndrome, a serious allergic reaction that can result in myocardial infarction. Presenting symptoms of such reactions can include chest pain occurring in association with an allergic reaction to Mersynofen.

Fixed Drug Eruption

Cases of Fixed Drug Eruption (FDE) have been reported with ibuprofen. Ibuprofen should not be reintroduced in patients with history of ibuprofen-related FDE.

4.8 ADVERSE EFFECTS (UNDESIRABLE EFFECTS)

Skin and subcutaneous tissue disorders:

Unknown: Drug Reaction with Eosinophilia with Systemic Symptoms (DRESS), <u>Fixed DrugEruptions</u> (FDE).

Cardiac disorders:

Unknown: Kounis syndrome.

Background:

Kounis syndrome (KS) has been defined as cardiovascular symptoms that occur secondary to allergic or hypersensitivity insults. It was thought to be a rare condition but is now being more commonly identified as the cause of acute coronary events in patients without previous history of coronary artery disease (CAD).

A fixed-drug eruption (FDE) is an immunological cutaneous adverse reaction characterized by sharply defined lichenoid lesion/s which occur/s at the same location every time there is exposure to the causative substance.
